## EV workshop held

by Sally Sedgwick

If you were part of an emergency response team for a car accident and found it was an electric car, would you know what to do?

Currently, that's a rare occurrence, said Al Ebbinga, trainer for SASCS (Safety and Security Consultant Specialists). Data shows that for every 100,000 gas vehicles sold you can expect that about 1,500 of them will be involved in a vehicle fire whereas out of every 100,000 all electric vehicles sold, only 25 will be involved in a vehicle fire. Still, the latter are the incidents that make the news, he said.

To deal with potential engine fires, responders are trained to disable the battery. But where is the battery on an electric car?

They actually have two, explained Rodney De Fouw, member electrification strategist from Great River Energy. One is a 12 volt battery under the hood that runs the car electronics/ accessories. But the essential battery is under the floor, and that is a 480 or 600 volt battery.



> Sales in Briggs and Stratton whole house generators and Generlink transfer switches increased dramatically after the storms this spring caused lengthy outages. Five have been installed this year with another eight in the warehouse ready for installation. Three additional generators have been ordered due to the present lead time to receive them.

#### Rebates


Rebates are still available. The current balance remaining for 2022 is \$13,250. Most of the rebates paid out have been for air source heat pumps: \$750 for Mini-Splits, and \$1,000.00 for central systems. The payback for these rebates is good as the energy and demand surpass the rebate amounts given in a short period of time.

North Itasca Electric is one of the

Energy and under 5,000 members, so it has been exempt from all CIP (Conservation Improvement Program) requirements, but we are still providing rebates to you the members. We feel it's the right thing to do because we are a cooperative.

#### **Headquarters HVAC system**

The new air source heat pump that was installed at North Itasca Electric this spring shows the proof is in the pudding. In July 2021, North Itasca Electric's energy consumption was 11,883 kWh. This July 2022, consumption dropped to 5,476 kWh - a reduction of 54 percent and a 58 percent reduction over our average monthly usage calculated in the chart. If the efficiencies are this good on the cooling side, which is less efficient than the heating side, I'm anticipating that we will be finding our savings will be better than anticipated.







## Staying powered up

by Jerry Loney The storms we experienced in May and June raised a stir. These outages were long-lasting for many members idea of wattage from Generlink's manual with fallen trees across lines, broken poles and a lightning strike on the Jessie Lake Substation.

The long outages took their toll on many with power being out not for a few hours, but for a few days. The necessity for energy is more prevalent today than ever.

This became even more apparent the last couple of months with the high number of Generlink disconnect switches and Whole House Generators

being ordered. After the first storm in May, I experienced a high number of calls asking about the Generlink disconnect switches North Itasca Electric offers and saw the need to place, a larger order for more.

#### **Generlink Disconnect Switches**

With this Generlink disconnect switch, there is no longer a need to run extension cords throughout your home to the various essential appliances you need to keep powered up. Just determine which appliances are necessary to run according to the wattage of your modules. It prioritizes loads enabling a 8000 watt portable generator can handle and propane consumption. most essential appliances without much trouble, but a good knowledge of your loads is necessary for good

power manaement.

North Itasca Electric stocks 30-amp disconnect switches, but they are also available in 40-amp with a 20-foot cord to match your generator's outlet connection. 20- and 50-amp connections and longer extension cords are also available if necessary.

Once purchased, North Itasca Electric's line crew will come out to install it, mounting it between your existing main meter socket and the main meter itself. The Generlink, cord, and installation cost is just under \$1,000.

The Appliance Energy Chart gives an of various appliances to determine the loads you can support with a portable generator; you must consider both the "running watt" and the "starting watt" requirements of loads you want to operate.

#### **Whole House Generators**

The Briggs and Stratton whole house generator North Itasca Electric sells makes it even easier for members. Connected to, and fueled by, your propane tank, there is no need for

monitoring fuel levels, determining essential appliances, or verifying if utility power has been restored.

These generators automatically start when an outage is detected and shut down when utility power

has been restored. The smallest whole house generator North Itasca Electric sells - 12 kW - can manage about everything you need, even when the higher load appliances such as dryers and water heaters are used.

The Symphone II transfer switch sold by the cooperative can control up to eight portable generator and start it. A 6500 to homeowner to reduce the generator size

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## Cooperatives handle the heat

As the summer began, you may have heard news about a shortage of electricity in the Midwest or concerns about the stability of the electric system. While it was true that there was less way we generate electricity by reducing surplus energy than we typically have, the use of fossil fuels and adding costthe Midwest electric system still had effective renewable resources, such as nearly 8 percent more electric generating capability than required to meet the fuel, which makes them environmentally expected demand.

In Minnesota, the situation is even better. All utilities in our state, including Great River

All utilities in our state... have more electric generating capacity than required.

Energy, have more electric generating of our members. capacity than required. As expected, the electric system performed reliably years in advance to ensure we have what throughout the summer season, keeping members cool and comfortable even during prolonged heatwaves.

When service interruptions do occur, they are typically due to weather events resulting in physical problems with the system, and not a lack of planning for adequate supply. As the electric industry continues to transition to more renewables and we face the impacts of more extreme weather events, Great River Energy is focused more and more on resiliency.

In emergency situations, the region's grid operator calls on additional power supply resources, imports energy from other regions and performs voluntary load reductions to manage the electric system. Temporary controlled manual load sheds, or periodic power outages, are used as a last resort to keep the system in balance.

The reliability of the electric system is paramount to electric cooperatives.

The electric system is designed to Great River Energy and North Itasca Electric Co-op operate and maintain an electric system that is dependable today and carefully planned to be resilient as we continue to make and use electricity in new ways.

Furthermore, every spring the team at Great River Energy performs detailed maintenance on our fleet of natural gas and fuel oil powered "peaking" power plants in preparation for response to the peak needs of the system. These plants can produce electricity in a matter of minutes when needed.

In addition, Great River Energy methodically designs, plans and operates a system of transmission lines that can handle high heat and elevated electricity demand. We also work with North Itasca Electric Co-op to reduce electricity use during strategic times to provide relief to the electric grid and ultimately save members money.

## Roxanne's Repair Tips: If your dryer doesn't heat...

Is your dryer taking longer to heat than it used to take? This is a common problem and can be an easy fix.

The first thing to check is make sure your setting is on a heat setting, then feel the clothes to see if they are warm when the dryer stops.

If the clothes are not warm, then would check the heating element. Sometimes you can see if it is bad; it might be broken right off or look burnt. If you can't tell use a multimeter to test for current.

If it's not the heating element, see if the exhaust pipe is plugged. To do this, detach it from the back of the dryer and use a hose brush to clean out any lint that a fire. is in there. Also, check where it blows the

air out of the house. If the vent is blocked it stops the air flow, which will cause your high limit thermostat to shut off too soon.


The high limit thermostat can be found on the heating element. There is also a cycling thermostat that is located on the blower housing that cycles your heat on and off. If either one of these is bad your dryer won't heat. These can be checked with a multimeter see if there is current to running through them. If not, you will have to replace whichever one is bad.

Some dryers have a moisture sensor located inside the drum. If this fails it will cause the cycle to stop too early as well.

Just a reminder: please make sure you clean your lint filter after every use, and once a year you should check your vent pipe where it hooks to the dryer and where it goes outside and clean any lint out

There is a certain amount of lint that gets past your lint filter and ends up in the bottom of your dryer by the heating element. I pop the top off my dryer and use a vacuum to suck that out every year. If you don't keep this clean it could start



## EV workshop for area first responders

different types of electric vehicles such as how to disarm the vehicles and where to use cutters without cutting lines to the high voltage battery if the car needs to be opened. Attendees learned, for example, that water instead of foam should be used in case of fire, that the 12 volt battery enables the larger under-floor battery, and that any leakage from the floor battery is a nontoxic coolant.

"When seconds matter, good information can make a difference,"

said De Fouw.

GRE's goal is to have 1,000 firefighters and first responders trained across the state this year. It looks achievable: about 800 have been trained so far.

Three all-electric cars were on display for the attendees, including an all-electric Hyundai brought by De Fouw, a 2021 Tesla Model Y brought by cooperative member David Valerio and a Chevy Bolt EUV brought by a first responder.

### The experience: an owner's perspective

Valerio became interested in the Tesla because of the technology. And that technology is impressive. From the large screen inside the vehicle, the driver can access most functions, including the car cameras, energy use statistics and charge status. The car will also do enhanced navigation; not only will it plot your route, but also identify supercharger stations and time needed to charge the car.

Because of the charge time, extended trips do take longer – Valerio counts on 12 hours with four charging stops for the trip to visit relatives that takes 10 hours in a conventional vehicle. Most of his charging takes place at home, however. In fact last month that figure was 78 percent, according to the Tesla app on his phone. The factory listed range for a charge is 326 miles, but realistically it is a little less, and in the winter it drops to about 170 miles, he said.

The savings really comes in gas costs. He saves about \$300 monthly in gas for



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

Weather is another factor in planning. Weather events are increasing, and climate assessments are looked at 30 to 50 years out. Transmission lines are now designed for 110 mph wind, or 1 inch of ice and 50 mph wind. In northern Minnesota, wildfire is also a consideration.

"We invest at GRE to keep costs down," said Patel, pointing out the importance of smoothly operating infrastructure. New construction to meet growing needs is also important. A recently announced project will build a transmission line running from the Iron Range to central Minnesota's Cassie's

Crossing Substation, scheduled for completion by 2030.

Dolinski thanked GRE for its participation in the substation development and construction. "Although North Itasca Electric is small," he said, "in the cooperative style we have always been treated as a priority with GRE."
