HF1171/SF1242 **Property Tax on Co-op Distribution** Infrastructure

We introduced this legislation last year. Since the late 30's cooperatives paid a flat tax per member rather than being issued property tax based on total plant. The value in using electric heat

by Jerry Loney

Are you looking for a reliable heat source for your home or business but don't know what the best option is? North Itasca Electric can help.

With electricity being 100% efficient at the meter, you receive all the value you're paying for. When using a fossil fuel such as propane or fuel oil, there will always be inefficiencies. These inefficiencies come from unburned fuels from combustion. That unburned fuel that is exhausted outdoors from propane could be from 5-10%, fuel oil up to 15-20%. This would equate to \$100 - \$400 in wasted heat per year.

When heating with electricity, at the meter there are no inefficiencies, for every kWh consumed, 3412 Btus are produced. It doesn't matter if you are using baseboards, plenum heaters, boilers or space heaters, one kWh puts

out 3412 Btus no matter what - and there is no longer a need to keep checking your propane or fuel oil tank.

Not only are you saving \$100 - \$400 in wasted heat, the cost equivalent on North Itasca Electric dual fuel program is \$1.80 per gallon of propane and Electric to p.3 >

SF1622/SF1656 II.IA State Matching **Funds and Technical Assistance** to Unlock Federal Infrastructure Funding.

This bill is necessary to give Minnesota access to the Federal funding available through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act. The bill will include grant writing assistance funds and infrastructure grants that will be made available to small utilities, cities and tribal governments to allow these entities to arrange for technical guidance funding.

SF116/HF1151 Load Control Receivers

This bill concerns the equipment necessary to run our Off-Peak program. Many electric cooperatives use this program to reduce costs to Member-Owners and to ensure reliability to the grid. When we need to work on this equipment owned by the Co-op we send qualified employees to your homes and businesses. Many times, a simple door

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors was held at the office and electronically through Zoom on January 26, 2023.

Start Regular Board Meeting: 10:00 a.m.

- o Pledge of allegiance was recited.
- o A motion was made to adopt agenda. Seconded; motion carried. A motion was made to consent agenda. Seconded, motion carried.

- o D. Pederson gave the Line Department report. Irby did testing of all our tools. Rachel from Star Energy was here to review the 4-year work plan. Brad has submitted the plan to RUS for approval. My understanding is that propane prices are now \$2.49 per gallon. A home consuming 1000 gallons of propane per year would pay \$2,490. With an inefficiency of 10%, electric consumption would be 24,135 kWh. On the dual fuel rate of

GRE ends year on high note

Strong financial results allowed Great River Energy to return a bill credit to its member-owners

Not-for-profit cooperatives like Great River Energy provide electric service at cost and any additional gains are returned to the membership. As it closed the books on 2022, the cooperative issued nearly \$25 million in bill credits, bringing the year-end total of bill credits to just over \$38 million returned to members.

"Cooperatives are united. We share in our success and stick together when challenges come up," said Great River Energy Board Chair Bob Bruckbauer. "We are thrilled to share Great River Energy's strong financial performance with our member-owners." This is the sixth consecutive year Great River Energy has issued bill credits to members at the end of the year.

The latest bill credits coincide with cost pressures for many electricity providers due to supply chain challenges and inflation.

Cooperatives also return capital credits to members, similar to how a publicly held company returns dividends. Great River Energy's memberowner cooperatives spent years investing in the financial strength of Great River Energy by gradually increasing equity over time, with the goal of returning patronage capital to members.

Great River Energy issued \$25 million in patronage capital credits to members in 2022 and expects to return additional patronage capital credits this spring.

Do you find you are stretching the budget to cover the electric bill in one season but it is easy in another? In our four-season climate, electricity use can vary widely during the year.

There's a way to cope with this! Budget billing uses your average electricity use across the previous year to calculate a constant monthly payment. We let you know each month where you stand so you can adjust the payment if needed.

The true-up month is June, so the July statement will reflect any amount owed in excess of the monthly payments, or a credit to the account.

For extra ease, combine budget billing with autopay and don't worry about the calendar!

Gopher State One Call

Confused about what Gopher State One Call is all about, when you need to call and how much notice you need to give? Click on Gopher State One Call under the "Safety" tab on the website to link to the state One Call page. You can submit a ticket and find out about the service.

One Call is a free service allowing companies that operate underground utilities like water, electricity and telephone cables to mark their service lines so they aren't inadvertently cut. Private underground lines - like the lines that extend from North Itasca Electric's meter to the house or invisible fences are not marked.



Cold weather rule & energy assistance program notice

In accordance with Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule, electric service cannot be disconnected for nonpayment between Oct. 1 and April 30 if electricity is the primary heat source and ALL of the following statements apply:

- Your household income is at or below 50% of the state median household income. Income may be verified on forms provided by North Itasca Electric Cooperative or by the local energy assistance provider.
- You enter into and make reasonably timely payments

If you cannot pay your winter heating bills, contact one of these locations for energy assistance help.

Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule does not completely stop winter disconnects before disconnecting electric service to residential members between Oct. 1 and April 30,

North Itasca Electric Cooperative must provide:

- A 30-day notice of disconnection;
- A statement of members' rights and responsibilities;
- A list of local energy assistance providers;
- Forms on which to request Cold Weather Rule protection; and
- A statement explaining available payment plans and other options to continue service.

Energy Assistance Program

The Energy Assistance Program (EAP) is a federally funded program through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services which helps low-income renters and homeowners pay for home heating costs and furnace repairs. Household income must be at or below 60 percent of the state median income (\$67,764 for a family of four) to qualify for benefits. Applications must be received or postmarked by May 31, 2023. Bylaw amendment to be voted on at annual meeting

The Board of Directors is recommending the adoption of the following Bylaw Amendment. This amendment is necessary to hold member meetings virtually.

Section 8. Remote Communications for Member Meetings.

- (a) This Section shall be construed and applied to facilitate remote communications consistent with reasonable practices concerning remote communication and with the continued expansion of those practices.
- (b) The Board of Directors is authorized to hold annual or special meetings of the members, the Board of Directors or any committee designated or appointed by the Board of Directors solely by means of remote communication through which the members, the Board of Directors or such committee representatives may participate in the meeting. Furthermore, the Board of Directors is authorized to determine that a member, Board of Directors member or committee representative not physically present in person at an annual or special meeting of members, the Board of Directors or any committee designated or appointed by the Board of Directors may, by means of remote communication, participate in a meeting of members, the Board of Directors or such committee held at a designated place. Such participation by a member, Board of Directors or such committee representative by means of remote communications constitutes presence at the meeting in person if all other requirements set forth in this Section 8 are met.
- (c) In any meeting of the members, the Board of Directors or any committee designated or appointed by the Board held solely by means of remote communication or in any meeting of the members, Board of Directors or any committee designated or appointed by the Board held at a designated place in which one or more members, Board-members or committee representatives participate by means of remote communication, the Cooperative must implement reasonable measures to verify that each person deemed present and entitled to vote at the member, Board-member, or committee representative, as applicable; and the Cooperative must implement reasonable measures to provide each member, Boardmember or committee representative participating by means of remote communication with a reasonable opportunity to participate in the meeting, including an opportunity to: (i) read or hear the proceedings of the meeting substantially concurrently with those proceedings; (ii) if allowed by the procedures governing the meeting, have the member's, Board-member's or committee representative's remarks heard or read by other participants in the meeting substantially concurrently with the making of those remarks; and (iii) if otherwise entitled, vote on matters submitted to the members, Board or committee representatives.

The Board of Directors may adopt such guidelines and procedures applicable to participation in member, Board of Director and committee meetings by means of remote communications as it deems appropriate.


- (d) Any ballot, vote, authorization, or consent submitted by electronic communication submitted by a member, Board-member or committee representative may be revoked by the member, Board-member or committee representative who submitted the same so long as such revocation is received by the President or the Secretary of the Cooperative at or before the meeting and prior to the vote being accepted and tallied in the election or other action being taken.
- (e) Participation in a meeting by remote communication described in clause (b) or (c) of this Section 9 is a waiver of notice of that meeting, except where the member, Board-member or committee representative objects at the beginning of the meeting to the transaction of business because the meeting is not properly called or convened, or objects before a vote on an item of business because such item may not properly be considered at the meeting and does not participate in consideration of the item at the meeting.
- **Section 9. Certain Definitions.** The following words or phrases when used in these By-Laws have the meanings set forth below:
- (a) "authenticated" means, with respect to an electronic communication, that the communication is delivered to the principal place of business of the Cooperative, or to an officer or agent of the Cooperative authorized by the Cooperative to receive the communication, and that the communication sets forth information from which the Cooperative can reasonably conclude that the communication was sent by the purported sender.
- person deemed present and entitled to vote at the meeting by means of remote communication is a member, Board-member, or committee representative, as applicable; and the Cooperative must implement reasonable measures to provide each member, Board-member or committee representative participating by means of remote communication with a reasonable measures.

 (b) "electronic communication" means any form of communication, not directly involving the physical transmission of paper that creates a record that may be communication, and that may be directly reproduced in paper form by the recipient through an automated process.
 - (c) "remote communication" means communication via electronic communication, conference telephone, video conference, the Internet, or such other means by which persons not physically present in the same location may communicate with each other on a substantially simultaneous basis.



Expansion of conditions means more veterans eligible for benefits

Last August, the largest federal Veterans bill in history was signed into law. And it recognized new or expanded benefits for many

The Itasca County Veterans Services Department wants to make sure those benefits come to any eligible veteran, their spouse or dependents in the county. Veterans Service Officer Luke St. Germain is urging veterans to be sure they are registered in the county and know their benefit status.

Gulf War and post 9/11 eras.

The Sergeant First Class Heath Robinson Honoring our Promise to Address Comprehensive **Toxics** (PACT) Act expanded "presumptive" locations and conditions for service members. That means that if a person saw service in a specified location and time period, they are presumed to have had exposure to toxic substances. If they develop a listed medical condition, they are able to apply for benefits.

For Viet Nam era Vets, that includes exposure to although her service Agent Orange and in limited cases, radiation. For Gulf War and post 9/11 service, generally means

The Act added five new locations for Viet Nam service, including any U.S. or Royal Thai military bases in Thailand, Laos, Mimot or Krek Cambodia, Guam or American Samoa, Johnston Atoll or on a ship which called at Johnston Atoll. All locations are limited by dates of duty. It also added two new disease conditions, a certain blood cancer and most importantly - high blood pressure.

For Gulf War and post 9/11 veterans, the list of conditions have been expanded by more than 20 types.

If the veteran has died from one of the conditions associated with the location of his service, a surviving spouse can still claim benefits. Claims can also look back, or denied claims can be revisited as a wider reach is authorized. In fact, St. Germain recalled one widow who was able to begin receiving monthly stipend member husband had passed away almost two decades before.


