One of the most important principles of a cooperative organization is member control. Most businesses of any appreciable size in the United States are stock corporations. Owning the stock of a corporation enables control of the corporation. More control comes with owning a greater percentage of the total stock issued by the corporation. A common term for a stock corporation in the electric utility industry is investor-owned utility, abbreviated as I.O.U.

A cooperative organization, such as the North Itasca Electric Co-op, is organized much differently compared to a stock corporation. In a co-op each person served by the organization is a member who has the same amount of control as any other member. The members collectively control the cooperative by electing representatives to the board of directors. Every director is a member of the co-op just like everyone else.

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors was held at the office and electronically through Zoom on April 27.2023.

Directors present: M. Rahier, B. Leino, J. White, W. Waller, L. Kongsjord, J. Kilian, R. Bain, L. Salmela, and T. Christensen.

Also Present: Andrew Shaw, CEO Brad Dolinski, Jerry Loney, Daryl Pederson, Tina Danielson and Kim Giesen.

Start Regular Board Meeting: 12:25 p.m.

o Pledge of allegiance was recited.

- o A motion was made to adopt the agenda. Seconded; motion carried. A motion was made to consent agenda. Seconded, discussion was held about a correction that needed to be made in the minutes; motion carried.
- o A motion was made to withdraw the proposed Amendment to Article 6 that was voted on in March. The Bylaws cannot be amended without a vote from the members. Seconded; motion passed.
- o Reviewed the final language of the proposed Bylaw Amendment change. A motion was made to approve as proposed. Seconded; motion carried.
- o Policy Review 200.30 Record Retention was reviewed. A motion was made to accept. Seconded; motion passed.
- o Andy stated that he has reviewed the audit letter, and everything looks good.
- o A safety discussion was held.
- o Tina Danielson presented the Operating Reports. A motion was made to accept the Operating Reports. Seconded; motion passed.
- o Daryl Pederson gave the Line Department report. Very few outages in March. We are still waiting to see what costs the state will cover on the Jessie Lake transformer. MREA compliance Review was completed on April 13, 2023. ROW clearing will probably start in May when the roads are in better condition.

- o Tina gave the Office Department report. Form 7 has been submitted to RUS. The Nominating committee meeting will be May 3. Tina discussed the ACH Shazam issue and thanked the office for taking calls.
- o B. Dolinski gave the CEO Update. Brad will now be on the committee working with communication efforts with MREA. GRE MMG met April 18th - the 1st quarter was the best that GRE has had in quite some time. Brad presented the Strategic Plan Goals in the form the board requested.

It has been busy the last couple months

Those members around Island Lake and a few others near Northome having load control programs such as Dual Fuel, Storage Water, or Storage Space Heating are now being controlled properly. Before the conversion, those on load control had Great River Energy's (GRE's) radio receivers and were being controlled according to GRE's load control strategies even though receiving energy from Minnkota Power which may or may not have been controlling. On the reverse side, Minnkota may had been controlling but with a GRE receiver, loads were not being controlled adding demand loads to the Northome substation. Getting this conversion done is a great accomplishment!

Energy Management Specialist I would like to welcome all new Member-Owners of North Itasca Electric Cooperative to our system. As a Member-Owner, you are entitled to many benefits such as the right to vote for board members, rebates for Energy Star products, Capital Credits, and for the main purpose of this note, introducing you to money saving options for heating and cooling your home.

North Itasca Electric offers reduced energy rates for those Member-Owners who heat with electric over fossil fuel systems. The reduced space heating rate on our Dual Fuel program is equivalent to paying \$1.62 per gallon for propane having 90% efficient equipment. For those having a Central Air Source Heat Pump installed, it is equivalent to \$.54 per gallon propane.

Not only do you save on your heating costs, but there is no more worrying about your propane tank running out halfway through the winter. Electric heat is also better for the environment with no CO2 discharged into the atmosphere, and it is 100% efficient at the meter.

Bylaw amendment to be voted on at annual meeting

The Board of Directors is recommending the adoption of the following Bylaw Amendment. This amendment is necessary to hold member meetings virtually.

Proposed Bylaw changes for the 2023 Annual Meeting.

Shall Article III of the Bylaws of North Itasca Electric Co-op., Inc. to include the following Section

Section 8 & 9

Remote Communications for Member Meetings

Section 8. Remote Communications for Member (iii) if otherwise entitled, vote on matters submitted Meetings.

(a) This Section shall be construed and applied to facilitate remote communications consistent with reasonable practices concerning remote communication and with the continued expansion of those practices.

(b) The Board of Directors is authorized to hold annual or special meetings of the members, the Board of Directors or any committee designated or appointed by the Board of Directors solely by means of remote communication through which the members, the Board of Directors or such committee representatives may participate in the meeting. Furthermore, the Board of Directors is authorized to determine that a member, Board of Directors member or committee representative not physically present in person at an annual or special meeting of members, the Board of Directors or any committee designated or appointed by the Board of Directors may, by means of remote communication, participate in a meeting of members, the Board of Directors or such committee held at a designated place. Such participation by a member, Board of Directors or such committee representative by means of remote communications constitutes presence at the meeting in person if all other requirements set forth in this Section 9 are met.

(c) In any meeting of the members, the Board of Directors or any committee designated or appointed by the Board held solely by means of remote communication or in any meeting of the members, Board of Directors or any committee designated or appointed by the Board held at a designated place in which one or more members, Board-members or committee representatives participate by means of remote communication, the Cooperative must implement reasonable measures to verify that each person deemed present and entitled to vote at the meeting by means of remote communication is a of communication, not directly involving the physical member, Board-member, or committee representative, transmission of paper that creates a record that may be as applicable; and the Cooperative must implement reasonable measures to provide each member, Boardmember or committee representative participating by means of remote communication with a reasonable opportunity to participate in the meeting, including an opportunity to: (i) read or hear the proceedings of the meeting substantially concurrently with those proceedings; (ii) if allowed by the procedures governing the meeting, have the member's, Board-member's or committee representative's remarks heard or read by other participants in the meeting substantially concurrently with the making of those remarks; and

to the members, Board or committee representatives. The Board of Directors may adopt such guidelines and procedures applicable to participation in member, Board of Director and committee meetings by means of remote communications as it deems appropriate.

(d) Any ballot, vote, authorization, or consent submitted by electronic communication submitted by a member, Board-member or committee representative may be revoked by the member, Board-member or committee representative who submitted the same so long as such revocation is received by the President or the Secretary of the Cooperative at or before the meeting.

(e) Participation in a meeting by remote communication described in clause (b) or (c) of this Section 9 is a waiver of notice of that meeting, except where the member, Board- member or committee representative objects at the beginning of the meeting to the transaction of business because the meeting is not properly called or convened, or objects before a vote on an item of business because such item may not properly be considered at the meeting and does not participate in consideration of the item at the meeting.

Section 9. Certain Definitions. The following words or phrases when used in these By- Laws have the meanings set forth below:

(a) "authenticated" means, with respect to an electronic communication, that the communication is delivered to the principal place of business of the Cooperative, or to an officer or agent of the Cooperative authorized by the Cooperative to receive the communication, and that the communication sets forth information from which the Cooperative can reasonably conclude that the communication was sent by the purported sender.

(b) "electronic communication" means any form retained, retrieved, and reviewed by a recipient of the communication, and that may be directly reproduced in paper form by the recipient through an automated process.

(c) "remote communication" means communication via electronic communication, conference telephone, video conference, the Internet, or such other means by which persons not physically present in the same location may communicate with each other on a substantially simultaneous basis.

February 23, on On North Itasca Electric along with Star Energy Services hosted an open house on the Briggs and Stratton generators North Itasca Electric is selling and on the new of "Simpliphi" line battery backup systems construction Briggs and Stratton now owns. Since the time of our first generator being sold, North Itasca Electric has sold 20 whole house generators, three being 20kW and the rest 12kW. Of these 20 generators, we only had a couple glitches which have been resolved with firmware upgrades and one generator which did not get programmed installation. during Otherwise, we are having good success with them.

Now having several generators in the field, it will be time for oil changes, and I have ordered several maintenance kits for this. We have Archie Wass on board for those that do not want to change oil themselves. If you desire to have Archie do this for you, give North Itasca Electric a call and we can scheduled schedule it for you.

During the last couple months, I also attended courses on Air Source Heat Pumps, Net Metering for solar installations, Briggs and Stratton generators and battery systems.

You might be getting tired of hearing me talk about heat pumps, but the technology has improved so much and the benefit is so great, it is hard not to.

Questions on Net Metering continue rolling in, all I can say on this is, think about the reasons

you really want to install solar first before jumping

The course I attended battery backup systems was informative and a potential means to reduce loads during peak periods as well as acting as a backup system during outages.

Spring is here and start that it's time to project you've been waiting for. With any construction project comes the question, how to heat the space? Not a problem when you come to North Itasca Electric for the answers. Just last week I worked up an answer for one cabin builder, quoting him a storage heat system using a Steffes furnace. He wanted electric heat with ductwork for air conditioning. The Steffes furnace is a good option because with it comes the ability to add on an air source heat pump within its ductwork, further reducing energy costs another 25%. By taking advantage of a load control program with his heat pump, he will be paying the equivalent of \$0.72 per gallon propane. Roxanne's Repair Tips:

"Boy, this refrigerator seems to be running a lot!"

There are a few things that can cause this, some are easy fixes while others take a little more knowledge.

Make sure the door is shut all the way, and the seal makes good contact. If not, wash the seal with hot soapy water and see if that helps. If this doesn't solve your problem, you might want to check the seal over. Are there any cracks or tears in the seal? If so, replace the seal. You can put your model in on RepairClinic. com to search for the right seal for your refrigerator.

Most people think that all appliances need to be level to work properly. This is true in most cases, but not for the refrigerator and upright freezer. With these it is best to have the front two legs a little higher than the back ones so if the door doesn't get shut all the way it will swing shut. This will save you a lot of grief and gives you peace of mind, especially if you have younger children who don't pay close attention to shutting the door.

Another thing to look for are the coils clean. The coils are normally found under the refrigerator but if you have an older model they might be on the back. If the coils are all plugged up with dust they won't cool properly, and your refrigerator will keep running to try to cool the freon. You should clean the dust off the coils at least twice a year. You might be shocked at the amount of dust that gets under your refrigerator. The freezer temperature should be under 10 degrees Fahrenheit otherwise the refrigerator will not be cold enough. Your freezer temperature should be set between 0 & 5 degrees. If the freezer temperature is too high, check the coils under the refrigerator and make sure they are all clear and that the condenser fan is running properly. Also look to see if frost has accumulated on the condenser coils. If they are all frosted up, that means that part of the defrost system failed.

The defrost assembly turns on many times a day to clear any frost that has accumulated on the coils. If the defrost heater assembly fails, the refrigerator will not defrost, and the frost will build up on the coils. This will cause your refrigerator to run steadily because it is trying to cool itself and cannot. If you suspect this is the problem, you can check the defrost heater assembly by using a multimeter. If there is no continuity the part is bad, and you will need to replace it.
