A nip of fall has come

A touch of frost has come, and the changing colors give us the clear warning winter is coming. Every year it seems I send out a message reminding you to get ready for winter (as if it isn't obvious), and every year I talk on how to be more energy efficient. I might even sound like a broken record, but the simplest things do make a difference. Below are some affordable and no-cost things that can be done to reduce energy consumption.

- Set the thermostat to 68 degrees.
- Run ceiling paddle fans on low, blowing upwards.
- Change furnace filter monthly.
- Ensure windows are sealed by locking them.
- Insulate exterior wall outlets and switches with foam pads.
- Caulk along windows and doors with a clear sealant.
- Close fireplace dampers when not in use.
- Caulk all exterior wall penetrations.

- Close drapes at night to keep heat in. Open during the day for solar heat.
- Insulate attic access door.
- Do not close off unused rooms that are conditioned by forcedair systems.
- Do not close supply air registers.
- Check to be sure return grilles are not blocked by furniture or bookcases.

Winter energy efficiency

- Do not use roof-top power ventilator for attic exhaust.
- Use heavy-duty, clear sheets of plastic on the inside of windows to reduce the amount of cold air entering your home.
- Minimize use of electric space heaters.
- Ensure Air Source Heat Pumps are kept clean and free of debris.
- When using the fireplace, reduce heat loss by opening damper in the bottom of the firebox (if provided) or open the nearest window slightly.
- In basements, caulk and seal the sill plate and band joist.
- Ensure floor registers are not blocked with rugs, drapes or furniture.
- If in unconditioned space, insulate your ducts

and make sure they are tightly connected to your HVAC equipment.

If you can invest in \$35.00 equipment that would require savings over a short period of time, hundreds of dollars each year in heating costs could be saved. \$35.00

Again I need to express the benefits of Air Source \$10.00 Heat Pumps (ASHPs). Instead of creating heat, they move heat. Even with cold outdoor temperatures, there is heat in it, and heat

pumps pull that heat into your home without creating more emissions from fossil fuel furnaces.

Electricity is needed to operate ASHPs but at a much lower amount than is needed to create heat for the space. A normal heat pump can heat your home down to 20 degrees before losing the 250% to 300% efficiencies they produce. And now today, there are ASHPs that will heat homes down to -10 degrees without starting an alternate heat source. It is true that as the temperature drops so does their efficiency, but the operating costs are still less than that of changing fossil fuel costs. Take a new Cold Climate Air Source Heat Pump (CCASHP), for instance, which the specifications say will heat down to -10 degrees (even their efficiency drops with temperature), but there are still efficiencies by moving heat than having to produce it. In Minnesota there are 69 days from October – April when temperatures are below freezing and, of those, 21.5 days that fall below zero degrees annually.

Your 2,500 square foot home has a 75,000 Btu 90% efficient propane furnace that burns 0.23 gallons per hour with temperatures at 20 degrees. This is the temperature where most ASHPs need to be turned off and alternate fuel sources used. At 0.23 gallons per hour, you would be consuming 5.52 gallons per day. With propane cost at \$2.00 per gallon, heating costs would be \$11.04 per day.

The equivalent in electricity of 0.23-gallon x 91,500

Btu's per gallon / 3412 Btu's per kW = 6.17 kW per hour or 148 kWh per day. With ASHP efficiencies between 250% - 300%, 59.2 - 49 kWh per day. On the general service rate of \$0.1288, the cost of operating that ASHP would be between \$7.62 and \$6.31 per day, or roughly half of that for \$2.00 per gallon propane.

If you would place your ASHP on the Dual Fuel rate of \$0.067 you could reduce your heating cost further from \$7.62 to \$4.02 or from \$6.31 to \$3.32 per day.







Cold weather rule & energy assistance program notice

In accordance with Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule, electric service cannot be disconnected for nonpayment between Oct. 1 and April 30 if electricity is the primary heat source and ALL of the following statements apply:

- Your household income is at or below 50% of the state median household income. Income may be verified on forms provided by North Itasca Electric Cooperative or by the local energy assistance provider.
- You enter into and make reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household.
- You receive referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation, or other programs likely to reduce your energy bills from North Itasca Electric Cooperative. Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule does not completely stop winter disconnects before disconnecting electric service to residential members between Oct. 1 and April 30.

North Itasca Electric Cooperative must provide:

- A 30-day notice of disconnection;
- A statement of members' rights and responsibilities;
- A list of local energy assistance providers;
- Forms on which to request Cold Weather Rule protection; and
- A statement explaining available payment plans and other options to continue service.

Energy Assistance Program

Name

The Energy Assistance Program (EAP) is a federally funded program through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services which helps low-income renters and homeowners pay for home heating costs and furnace repairs. Household income must be at or below 60 percent of the state median income (\$67,764 for a family of four) to qualify for benefits. Applications must be received or postmarked by May 31, 2024. 



Spooky Energy Savings

This spooky season, we're sharing a few energysaving tricks so you can treat yourself to lower energy bills. Here are four simple ways to summon the spirit of energy efficiency.

Conjure instant savings with a smart thermostat. One of the easiest ways to save energy is through thermostat control, since home heating and cooling account for a large portion of monthly energy use. Smart thermostats can help you manage heating and cooling costs by learning your daily routine and adjusting the temperature settings accordingly. You can control a smart thermostat from anywhere (through your smart phone), which allows you to prevent unnecessary energy consumption while you're away. Sorcery!

Get rid of goosebumps by eliminating ghostly drafts. The winter chill is just around the corner, so now is the time to seal air leaks around your home. Apply caulk and weatherstripping around drafty windows and doors to make your home more comfortable and lower energy use.

Illuminate your lair with energy efficient lighting. LED bulbs use 75% less energy and last 25 times longer than incandescent light bulbs. Make the switch to reduce energy used for lighting. Remember to use LEDs when it's time to decorate for the upcoming holiday season. LED light strings offer an average of 88% energy savings compared to traditional incandescent light strings.

Stir up savings with countertop cauldrons. Cooler weather summons our favorite soup recipes. Small countertop appliances like slow cookers use less energy than cooking meals on the stovetop. Grab your book of spells (or recipes) and start stirring up savings in the kitchen.

When we look around our homes, there are many opportunities to save energy. So this spooky season, investigate your space and unlock a different kind of magic – the kind that brings real energy savings.

Electrical Inspections

Except for minor repair work, all electrical work you do at your home, cabin, or property is required to be inspected by a State Electrical Inspector.





A resolution was passed for a preliminary levy of \$203,940.25, an increase of 1.5 percent over 2023. The preliminary budget is \$908,227.

The council voted to accept quotes for the two retaining walls totaling \$36,675. Widseth is still accepting quotes for the trestle and pedestrian bridge projects.

ISD318 Business Manager Kara Lundin spoke on the two operating levies and one capital projects levy going before District voters this fall. The District has cut 70 administrative positions and elementary art, music and Spanish, she said. An operating levy for \$1,100 per pupil would avoid further cuts, a \$2.5 million capital projects levy would restore cuts and invest in technology and buses, and an additional \$300 per pupil operating levy would maintain class sizes and enhance career education. The second levy can only pass if the first is passed, and the third only if the first two are passed. Bigfork Valley seeks \$1M levy

The Bigfork Valley Hospital board of directors listened to three hours of public testimony in a public meeting on Aug. 30 and in public comments at the Sept. 5 board meeting before deciding on a \$1 million levy request for 2024 on a 5-4 vote with 3 abstentions.

The levy request was reduced from the \$1.5 million proposed and tabled at the Aug. 1 meeting. The 2023 levy was \$836,220.

Later in the meeting, CEO Aaron Saude requested a meeting with the board executive team to explore terms of a mutual separation; there are three years left on his contract with the hospital. In a phone interview, Chair George Rounds said he had tendered his resignation from the board. Acknowledging that there are things that have to be changed, he felt the board will do a good job, and the hospital will thrive.

During the board meeting, CFO Darla Anderson spoke directly to the need for the levy in meeting loan covenants. However, she believed that the debt service ratio and cash could be maintained for four years at the present levy amount. In response to a question, she said that \$1.5 million was in bad debt status out of \$3.1 million owed to the hospital for services.

A revised analysis of the tax impact on residents included an increase in number of parcels and one large value parcel addition. These changes would significantly lower the impact on

residents.

After discussion, the board voted to purchase equipment for an Ear, Nose and Throat specialty for \$193,000. A new physician would start Dec. 1 and will train a mid-level assistant.

The next regular public meeting of the hospital board is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 3 at 9 a.m. in the Board

Effie votes "yes" on cell tower

In an unanimous vote at its September 11 meeting, the Effie City Council approved a conditional use permit for a 400 ft. cell tower to be constructed in the city by Verizon at a cost of \$500,000. The service radius would be five miles.

About 40 people attended the meeting, offering a dozen public comments. Those in favor pointed out that it would benefit the whole community and that children needed the technology to be available; and that those living by themselves needed it in case of emergency.

Emergency and medical services were also represented, saying that there was a dark zone north of Effie with no service for GPS ambulance directions or confidential communications with the hospital; and that there was no medical proof that cell towers harm people.

Those opposed said that the city should benefit instead of one landowner; the technology was too new; and that a pause should be considered for safe siting with adequate setbacks. Tammy Hartman, Verizon network outreach manager, Great Plains, said that safety issues were covered by the FCC license, and the project also had FAA clearance with relation to the Bigfork Airport.

Hartman said the project had been underway since 2021, with construction slated for 2024. She was asked why the zoning request and city notification were just happening now, and replied that objections were not expected. Stopping the project now would effectively cancel it, she indicated.

The council decided to proceed with purchase of a remote monitoring system which would take sewer system daily readings for approximately \$5,700 plus the cost of cell service.

A resident asked the city to check the easement on the road to the sewer plant crossing his property.

The council voted for a proposed levy amount of \$40,425.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for Monday, Oct. 9 at 6 p.m. in the Community Center.

Anglers invited to comment

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources will hold an open house to collect public comments and share information on two proposed fishing regulation changes related to sunfish in Lake Winnibigoshish and connected waters, and northern pike in Balsam, Haskell and Scrapper lakes in Itasca County.

The open house will be 5-7 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 4, at the Squaw Lake Community Center. On Lake Winnibigoshish and the connected Mississippi River to Cass Lake, the daily limit would be reduced to five sunfish. In the connected lakes of Balsam, Haskell and Scrapper (Itasca County), a 24- to 36-inch protected slot limit, with a three-fish possession limit, would be applied to northern pike. Currently, Balsam Lake has this limit, but the other two connected waters do not.

If adopted, the proposed sunfish regulations would be effective beginning March 1, 2024, and the northern pike regulations would be effective May 11, 2024. Comments will be accepted through Friday, Oct. 20.
