Reasons why bills might seem high

fails to communicate with the office, the billing software will see it as general service usage and bill it at that rate instead of the off-peak or dual fuel rate.

This also happens when breakers to the off-peak equipment get turned off. If there is no power to the meter it can't communicate the reading to the office. This is why breakers on.

To the right is a fiveday example of a main is calculated for equipment and dual fuel meter where all energy flows through the main showing how the submeter usage is subtracted. If the submeter doesn't communicate the reading to the office, energy doesn't get subtracted from the main meter at the reduced rate.

Problems with submeters not communicating are very small but can happen. The largest reason for high bills is related to other issues, mostly members being unaware of the amount of energy plug-in appliances consume, such as electric space heaters, heat tapes, head bolt heaters, water tank heaters for cattle, and such. The average family consumes between 800 to 1,200 kWhs per month. At the general service rate this would equate to \$104 to \$154.

Submeters on a space heating load control rate can vary widely depending on many conditions such as thermostat settings, outdoor temperatures, how tight homes are built to retain heat, windows, and such.

Efficient heating equipment does play a role in saving heating costs, but the largest savings is

in keeping the heat inside if one has an older home, 741 Watts of electricity and not escaping to the outdoors. Once a heat loss this is the number to look at. Not only does infiltration affect heating costs and comfort but cooling costs and comfort as well during the summer months. Below are some examples of the effects of infiltration from a heat calculation loss done some time ago.

Poor: (old house poorly built) may have an air exchange rate of 1 per hour.

1 ACPH = 28,238BTUs (8.27 kWhs) x $0.0673 = 0.57 \times 24 =$ \$13.37 per day.

Average: (normal construction, poor vapor barrier) .7 air changes per hour

.7 ACPH = 19.692 BTUs (5.77 kWhs) x $0.0673 = .39 \times 24 =$ \$9.36 per day.

Excellent: (Excellently constructed and sealed vapor barrier) .3 air changes per hour.

.3 ACPH = 8,360 BTUs $(2.45 \text{ kWhs}) \times (0.0673) =$ $.16 \ge 24 = $3.84 \text{ per day}.$

With today's building codes we see only excellent construction, but it could be average or poor to produce the work of 1 depending on its age.

In accordance with Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule, electric service cannot be disconnected for nonpayment between Oct. 1 and April 30 if electricity is the primary heat source and ALL of the following statements apply:

- Your household income is at or below 50% of the state median household income. Income may be verified on forms provided by North Itasca Electric Cooperative or by the local energy assistance provider.
- You enter into and make reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household.
- You receive referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation, or other programs likely to reduce your energy bills from North Itasca Electric Cooperative. Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule does not completely stop winter disconnects before disconnecting electric service to residential members between Oct. 1 and April 30,

North Itasca Electric Cooperative must provide:

- A 30-day notice of disconnection;
- A statement of members' rights and responsibilities;
- A list of local energy assistance providers;
- Forms on which to request Cold Weather Rule protection; and
- A statement explaining available payment plans and other options to continue service.

Energy Assistance Program

The Energy Assistance Program (EAP) is a federally funded program through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services which helps low-income renters and homeowners pay for home heating costs and furnace repairs. Household income must be at or below 60 percent of the state median income (\$67,764 for a family of four) to qualify for benefits. Applications must be received or postmarked by May 31, 2024. 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GRE's Resource Plan approved

The Minnesota Public Utilities Commission (PUC) gave the green light to Great River Energy's integrated resource plan (IRP), which outlines the cooperative's 2023-37 generation portfolio investments.

Great River Energy's integrated resource plan outlines its plan to procure or construct more than 1,200 megawatts of wind power by 2037.

The plan is aimed at maintaining costs for Great River Energy's 27 member-owners while significantly increasing the amount of renewable energy. It was unanimously accepted by the commission on March 7 after being submitted more than a year ago.

IRPs serve as strategic roadmaps for utilities, outlining

their anticipated electricity generation methods over previous IRPs I've seen," Tuma said. "There was a lot the next 15 years, with the PUC providing advisory of good outreach to your members, the general public guidance.

Under the accepted IRP, Great River Energy plans to procure or construct more than 1,200 megawatts next IRP by April 1, 2026, with an interim update (MW) of wind power, 200 MW of energy storage and 200 MW of solar energy capacity by 2037. With this trajectory, the cooperative is poised to achieve its 30% carbon-free objective by 2025, with an expected 90%

Wild Rice and Butternut Squash Salad

- 1 1/2 cup wild rice, rinsed well
- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 1 teaspoon cumin
- 1 butternut squash, cut into 1/2 inch cubes
- 2 Tablespoons avocado or olive oil
- 2 Tablespoons maple syrup
- 1 cup dried cranberries

Cook 1 1/2 cups of rinsed wild rice in 4 cups of water with 1 teaspoon of salt. Mix with 1 cup mayonnaise and 1 teaspoon cumin, and cool.

Cut up a butternut squash into 1/2 inch cubes and toss with 2 Tablespoons oil and 2 Tablespoons maple syrup. Place on cookie sheet lined with parchment paper and bake in 380° degree oven 20-25 minutes or until tender.

Pour hot water over 1 cup of dried cranberries, drain and dry. Combine cooled rice mixture with cranberries and hot squash mixture and serve. Also good cold. Serves about 6.
