

world, purchasing and installing high efficiency equipment would be great! But it's not always possible with personal budget constraints or other aspects taking priority. Your home's energy efficiency can improve by doing some low to no cost maintenance.

The first place I look is up. What are the lighting sources? Are there LED lights installed in your home? What about the porch light you leave on like most of us do; is that LED?

For example, my porch light bulb was a 60-watt incandescent bulb left on for 24 hours a day because I'm forgetful. 60-watts in a 24-hour period is equal to 1.44 kilowatt-hours. If I leave my porch light on 24 hours a day for 7 days, my energy usage would go up by 10.08 kilowatt-hours. 10.08 multiplied by your energy rate (0.13) is equal to \$1.31. If I change that to a 7-watt LED bulb, in the same scenario I'd be spending \$0.15. Doesn't seem like much, but add 15 bulbs to that and your usage starts to climb without realizing it. Some of the newer bulbs are expensive, but we do offer rebates on bulbs when you change them out!

Another thing I am looking for is the condition of the furnace. It may be an older unit that runs great, but a few things can make your furnace run longer to meet your desired set point.

How often do you change your furnace filter? Is one time a year enough? Bigger homes with more air flow may need to be changed more frequently; add some pets to the mix and the filter gets dirty more often.

Another thing to look at is

visible connections. There could

be air loss around the duct work

needing some attention. Add some vent tape to keep air flow moving to the conditioned areas of the home. The outdoor condenser is often forgotten about but heavily relied on with the humid summer days. Keeping the coils clean, providing proper air flow, will keep the unit running more efficiently.

Refrigerator coils should also be cleaned. Grab a vacuum and get all the dust bunnies out of there; You might even find some hidden gems under there that your kids "lost."

We all want our homes to smell good. But have you ever thought about the usage your "fall colors" wax warmer is costing you to run? Most of the units have a 20-to-25watt bulb inside to melt the wax; little amounts of usage add up!

As I've mentioned before, I am here to help. If you as members have any questions or want some input on anything related to energy efficiency, please reach out! I'm more than happy to help in any way possible.

I hope the next month brings more good weather and all of you get to enjoy it.

The Cambridge Energy Storage Project represents a groundbreaking partnership between Great River Energy and Form Energy, aimed at addressing one of the most critical challenges in the energy sector: reliable, long-term energy storage. The pilot project will deploy Form Energy's cutting-edge iron-air battery technology, capable of storing energy for up to 100 hours — far exceeding the capabilities of traditional commercial deployment of Form lithium-ion batteries.

Following its completion, Great River Energy will conduct a multi-year study to evaluate the system's performance and its potential for broader deployment.

Raising awareness of electric cooperative career paths: Seeking a new generation of skilled labor

skilled trades professionals will retire and leave the workforce at a faster rate than younger workers can replace them

To maintain a safe and reliable electric system while tackling the energy challenges ahead, Great River Energy has set out to inform young people about the wealth of career opportunities in the electric industry, and specifically with electric co-ops

"Careers with electric cooperatives are meaningful, rewarding and available in communities all across Minnesota," said GRE Vice President and Chief Corporate and Member Services Officer Lisa Orpen. "Careers with co-ops allow young people to work for a cause and organization that supports their family, friends and neighbors.'

only face the challenge of replacing retiring employees, but they must also find people with the skills to advance the energy transition. The adoption of renewable energy and grid recent and future high school graduates modernization are introducing new and important career paths.

"Best of all, many cooperative careers do not require four-year degrees, allowing young people to start their Potential booth, where they could ask careers sooner," Orpen said.

Facing these challenges, Great River Energy and its member-owners are taking a proactive approach to building

Over the next 10 years, one-third of and supporting technical careers through its "Powerful Potential" program.

Powerful Potential is designed to educate high school students about careers in the electric industry and provide avenues for hands-on opportunities.

In late June, GREwelcomed 50 high school students to its first Cooperative Careers Camp. The all-day event provided attendees with a taste of Great River Energy's field technician and operations careers, many of which utilize skills that can be learned at a trade school or through an apprenticeship or training program.

GRE Vice President and Chief Transmission Officer Priti Patel addressed the camp, detailing Great River Energy's reputation as a leader in the electric industry. According to GRE and its member-owners not Patel, Great River Energy regularly hires passionate, driven, service-oriented, strategic thinkers to bring their skills and ideas to the team.

EPA's Power Plant Rule threatens electric reliability

As a consumer-member of North Itasca Electric Co-op, keeping the lights on at a cost you can afford is the focal point of everything we do. Transparency is one of our core values, so in addition to sharing coop successes, we also have a responsibility to tell you about the challenges too.

In May, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued a rule that impacts energy production from power plants. The power plant rule will undoubtedly threaten access to reliable electricity for our local community and communities across the country.

The rule constrains existing coal and new natural gas plants by requiring them to install carbon capture and storage (CCS)—a technology that has potential but has not been proven to be viable as required. No power plant in North America currently uses CCS at the scale and levels mandated by EPA. When power plants aren't able to comply with EPA's CCS requirements, they will be required to shut down, significantly limit operations, or switch fuels. These unrealistic standards will force the unnecessary and early shutdown of many power plants that currently provide reliable electricity 24/7.

Renewable sources, such as solar and wind, are important components of our overall generation mix. But given the intermittent nature of these energy sources, we simply cannot depend on them because the wind doesn't always blow and the sun doesn't always shine. The need for always-available power generating resources is still essential.

The timing of the power plant rule is equally troubling. At the same time the EPA is leading our nation down the path to fewer power plants, utilities are facing a surge in electricity demand – driven by the onshoring of manufacturing, the growth of the American economy and the rapid expansion of data centers to support artificial intelligence, e-commerce and cryptocurrency.

Many states have already experienced rolling outages, and if the supply of electricity is further threatened by the EPA's power plant rule, the problem will only get worse. In fact, the North American Electric Reliability Corporation (NERC), the nation's electric reliability watchdog, recently forecasted that over the next five years, all or parts of 19 states are at high risk of rolling power outages during normal peak electricity demand conditions.

It's also no secret that when demand is high and supply is low, costs go up. We're concerned about threats to reliability as well as cost increases to our members.

Just as we've always done, we will look for solutions that serve our members best. Co-ops are no strangers to innovation, and we're taking proactive steps to address today's energy challenges and tomorrow's energy needs. We've led the charge on industry endeavors such as community solar projects, and we'll continue to explore new technologies and strategies that bolster reliability and our local grid.

Which is best, a washer with agitator or impeller?

This is a question I get asked a lot, and the answer is a front load washer is the best. It has been proven that front load washers get your clothes the cleanest.

I feel there are some down sides to the front load washer though, some get dirty water trapped in the rubber seal causing it to smell bad; you must clean them regularly and leave them open between washes to dry out. I don't think they are very user friendly unless you put the front load washer and dryer on a pedestal, you must bend way down to put your clothes in and pull them out wet. If you have bad knees this can be a problem. Most front load washers have longer cycles than top loaders, and they usually cost more money.

As for the top load washer the pros say it is better to buy one without an agitator. We all grew up with a washer with an agitator, so for some it is hard to believe that without one your clothes will come out clean. Change can be hard.! You see with an agitator your clothes rub against the agitator and the agitator is moving your clothes up and down to get them clean. A

New customer arrangement with Crow Wing Power

In a special meeting on Aug. 1, Great River Energy's member-owner cooperatives approved the agreements required for Crow Wing Power to exit membership in Great River Energy.

Crow Wing Power's withdrawal from membership in Great River Energy will be effective Jan. 1, 2025, subject to expected approvals from MISO and Crow Wing Power's lender, the Rural Utilities Service.

Starting that date, Great River Energy will provide transmission service to Crow Wing Power through a customer contract. Great River Energy will continue to own, plan, build, operate, maintain and contract the transmission system necessary to provide Crow Wing Power with transmission and ancillary services.

Great River Energy will also provide short-term capacity through a separate agreement.

A top load washer with an impeller is easier on your clothes because your clothes rub against each other to get clean. Without the agitator there is nothing to get wrapped around, and the impeller moves your cloths back and forth to get them clean. I have always had a top load with an agitator until last year when I purchased a top load LG set with no agitator. I can honestly say I love it! There is so much more room for blankets and sheets, and they come out clean and not all tangled up.

Like everything, not all washers are created equal, you do get what you pay for in most cases. For instance, if you look at a Speed Queen top load washer and take your hand and try to move the inside basket around you will find there is very little movement. Now try the same thing with the other brands. Some will move more than the Speed Queen and then there are some that move all over the place. The ones that move all over are not made as well and usually won't last as long.

Anchor Inn Resort: 100 years of history

husband Monte purchased the Anchor Inn Resort from the Kitterman family who had owned it through three generations since 1968. The resort had just turned 100 years old, first opening in 1921 as a hunting lodge by William Osufsen. There are many repeat customers, some guests have been coming each year for as long as 40 years, said Heather. They bring with them tales of the history of the resort and - one recalled coming with his family 70 years ago.

Facing on the Bowstring River, the resort has access to the Bowstring chain of lakes which includes Rice, Sand and Little Sand Lakes as well as Bowstring Lake. Boats from the resort pass under the famous wooden fishing bridge on County Road 4 - a "hotspot"

for anglers. Adjacent to the resort, the Chapmans have set up a webcam with a one minute delay. Heather recalls one guest who caught a northern, called his wife, and she watched him noon-8 p.m., Thursday – Sunday. catch it online! The webcam is on the anchorinnresort.com.

Some of the most interesting

fishing is on Sand Lake, an almost 3600 acre lake that boasts a variety of structure and fish species, including both large- and smallmouth bass and rock bass, walleye, northern, bullhead, burbot and panfish. But although fishing is a prime activity for guests, there is lots to do in Itasca County, pointed out Heather, from fat tire biking and ATV/snowmobile trails to local attractions like the Lost 40 with its 350 year old trees and other local seasonal events and entertainment. Onsite the resort has kayaks, fishing boats and a pontoon, a paddle boat and boards. In fall, the cabins are full for grouse and duck seasons.

The four season resort has eight cabins, two campsites, and rents four fishing boats



Did you know that 3. Many of the residents 8. Almost half of the the actual speed limit on are elderly. County Road 174 (also known as the North Island Lake Road) is 55 mph?

These are many reasons that residents of Ardenhurst Township feel that 55 mph is an very unsafe speed for this road and that a much reduced speed limit should be implemented by the Itasca Transportation County Department:

North Island Lake 1. Rd (CR174) is a narrow gravel road with no shoulders along most of its length. Sight lines are poor in some places due to curves, hills, and overhanging trees.

2. This road has significant ATV/UTV, pedestrian, bicycle, and golf cart traffic.

4. There are two toddlers the road to get mail, to 4 living on this road and access the lake, or to many residents entertain access gardens, garages, young grandchildren as

well. 5. Many resident pets and local wildlife are also endangered by high speed

traffic. 6 The most heavily populated area is a 1.4 mile stretch that extends from the Marble residence east to the stop sign at CR 24.

7. Within this 1.4 mile stretch, there are 43 homes (on both sides of the road) and many are within 75' of the road.
