



Member Services Update by Drew Francisco

Hello again everyone!

Spring is in the air, and I can't wait for warmer temps and for things to finish thawing out. Crazy to think I've been in this position a year already!

I've spent the last weeks roaming few our service territory checking and replacing troublesome sub meters. Sub meters are the meters that control electric heating: whether it be dual fuel, storage heating or water heaters.



A lot of the properties I've visited have had their controlled services breaker off while they're away. I wanted to take some time to explain what state. You can see this happens to our meters on your energy bill when there isn't power

supplied to it. Once the power is shut off for the controlled service, the meter loses power and communication to our reporting system. This causes the meter to go into an "estimating"

some extra time out of the existing system; time is almost up.

The good news is we found a replacement option that is much more economical to transition to. We will be able to team with other cooperatives at GRE to reduce costs for all. This is what is called a "door swap." When we begin to deploy the new hardware, we will not have to replace all the parts. Rather, we will cut the seal, replace the outer door on the control device and finish the paperwork and computer work back at the office.

Now, the bad news. This technology comes at a price. I will make a recommendation to our board next week; how will we fund this project? Off-Peak equipment is not used by all North Itasca Member-Owners. The new expenses and equipment must be We had estimates for a new system of different technology of over two million dollars. We will be spending less than four hundred thousand dollars on the door swap option. My recommendation to the board; add a small equipment charge of roughly \$2 per month and also increase the kWh charge on Off-Peak rates roughly \$0.002/kWh. This will cover the expenses of the new system without a large increase in Member-Owners bills. If you were a large user of Off-Peak electric heat (4,000 kWh/month), I would expect your bill to increase by about eleven dollars that month.

reading. If the meter is in an estimating state, it will use the electrical usage from the prior year for billing purposes. The bad thing about that is the usage from the prior year could be way less, causing a low bill amount. Or it could estimate high, some more information, causing an over payment on kWs that weren't really used.

This can all be avoided by just making a phone call to the North Itasca Electric office. Letting us know that the breaker for your sub meter is off gives us the chance to move your meter into a our billing system, taking away the risk of estimated usage and saving your checkbook! Are you tax exempt?

If you have a second meter for either Dual Fuel or Storage Space heating to heat your home with electric heat, you qualify for a tax exemption status for the energy consumption by your heating equipment. It is easy to check by adding up all charges on your bill and multiplying them by \$0.07875. If the answer equals that shown on your bill, you are paying tax on your electric heat. You can avoid this tax by going to North Itasca Electric's website www.northitascaelectric. com, then go to the FIND A FORM tab and select Minnesota Sales Tax Exemption form. Complete and send to our office.

Great River Energy team recognized for application of novel EV

A team of Great River Energy employees was recently recognized by the Electric Power

Research Institute (EPRI) for the application of an interactive, online tool for understanding where, when challenges in planning for EV adoption, including: and how much electric vehicle (EV) charging load is likely to materialize on the U.S. grid.

GRE is one of 500 utilities, vehicle manufacturers, providers and other organizations forecasting and planning purposes charging collaborating on a three-year initiative known as EVs2Scale, which is designed to address challenges faced by these groups as they prepare to support EV goals that have targeted up to 50% market share by 2030.

Cold weather rule & energy assistance program notice

In accordance with Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule, electric service cannot be disconnected for nonpayment between Oct. 1 and April 30, if electricity is the primary heat source and ALL of the following statements apply:

- Your household income is at or below 50% of the state median household income. Income may be verified on forms provided by North Itasca Electric Cooperative or by the local energy assistance provider.
- You enter into and make reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household.
- You receive referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation, or other programs likely to reduce your energy bills from North Itasca Electric Cooperative. Minnesota's Cold Weather Rule does not completely stop winter disconnects. Before disconnecting electric service to residential members between Oct. 1 and April 30,

North Itasca Electric Cooperative must provide:

- A 30-day notice of disconnection;
- A statement of members' rights and responsibilities;
- A list of local energy assistance providers;
- Forms on which to request Cold Weather Rule protection: and
- A statement explaining available payment plans and other options to continue service.

Energy Assistance Program

The Energy Assistance Program (EAP) is a federally funded program through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services which helps low-income renters and homeowners pay for home heating costs and furnace repairs. Household income must be at or below 60 percent of the state median income (\$67,764 for a family of four) to qualify for benefits. Applications must be received or postmarked by May 31, 2025. 





This all required hands-on work. A lot of work. And the community responded. Outside contractors like Lovdahl Electric, Storlie Construction and Lakeside Lumber helped with pricing. Spring Lake Heating and Air donated the boilers and installation. Dahlke Dumpsters donated dumpsters and fees. The hands that scrubbed, painted and nailed came from many community volunteers, some of whom had their own life experiences to share, and who understood the importance of the project.

After the structure came the First Presbyterian Church secured new mattresses, box springs and linens. Handsewn quilts needed a plan. And that plan had were provided by other churches to include correcting plat lines that and quilting groups. Volunteers

> toiletry baskets. Chairs, lamps and tables were donated, engaging local churches, the hospital and community members.

hopes to start a mentorship program to connect community members to residents for conversation, classes or outside events.

People are often not aware of the need for housing and help with living, said Jess. For instance, there are those who have no family and just need a little assistance, she pointed out. When finished, 15 men and women can be served at Sam's Place.

Roxanne's Sales Talk

An induction cooktop looks pretty much the same as a ceramic cooktop with distinct zones where you can place your pots and pans.

Inside the cooking zone there is a tightly wound coil of metal. When alternate current that flows through the coil which produces an invisible high frequency alternating magnetic field all around it. Without a pan on the burner, the burner will not heat: the cooking zone remains cool.

The reason we need high frequency is because your home power supply alternates at about 50-60 Hz (50-60 times per second), an induction cooktop boosts this by 500-1000 times (typically to 20-40 Hz). Since this is well above the range that most of us can hear, it stops any annoying, audible buzzing that prevents magnetic forces from moving the pan around on the back could be that cooktop. 





- 1 cup sour milk
- 2 eggs
- 1 Tablespoon ginger
- 4 teaspoons baking soda

- 4 1/2 cups flour, more or less

Frosting 2 cups sugar 1 cup milk piece of butter

Cook in saucepan until soft ball can be formed. Beat until thick and creamy. While beating add vanilla if desired.

Cream shortening, add sugar and molasses. Sift dry ingredients and add alternately with milk. Use enough flour so mixture will be stiff enough to roll. Use large cookie cutter. Bake 10 minutes at 350°. Frost when cool if desired.

Congratulations to the Bigfork High School Backwoods Bots, who were regional winners at the Northern Lights Regional competition in Duluth for First® Robotics Competition Minnesota/Dakotas, Feb. 26-March 1.

What happens? First Robotics is set up as a game, with teams designing industrial-sized robots to do certain tasks and earn points, all within a 2.25 minute time limit.
