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BUSINESS REVITALIZATION GRANT PROGRAM 2025

The Bigfork Business Revitalization Grant Program, announced in January, was started with seed money from the Itasca Economic Development Corporation and supported by Bigfork Valley Hospital, the city of Bigfork, Bigfork School and North Itasca Electric Cooperative. Additional funding was provided by the Iron Range Resources and Rehabilitation Board. The goal was to provide matching grants to enable area businesses to make needed improvements and updates to the appearance of their property, both inside and outside.

Nine businesses were awarded grants in the first round of the program, which is administered locally. Grantees included:





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\$2,936.31 Bigfork Valley Golf on the Edge \$5,000.00 Jack the Horse Resort \$2,112.50 Pizza Parlor \$5,000.00 Sam's Place \$5,000.00

Four additional businesses received awards and elected to use \$500 of the funds to apply for funding from the Arrowhead Economic Opportunity Agency Business Energy Retrofit Program. Those include Antler Lake Lodge, Lakeside Lumber, Kocian's Family Market and Marcell Family Center. The BER is another grant opportunity for local businesses in the IRRRB service area which will provide a third of project funding up to \$20,000 for eligible energy projects.

Deadline for applications is Aug. 2. For more information, search www. aeoa.org, business & commercial services under the services tab.

the hospital or clinic all the way through to the insurance company and the money flowing to make all this work requires hundreds of computers humming in many dozens of offices and data centers. They all require electric power.

Most of us have heard about artificial intelligence. Most of the time we just shorten it to AI. Few people understand what exactly AI is or what it does. What does it do? How is it helpful? Should we welcome this new development, or should we be afraid of it? It's clearly the latest technological advancement.

it can do. In fact, we're already using it when we depend on some sort of electronic device to help us get where we're going. It might be an app on our phone or a system in our car. Some gizmo on my phone knows how to find the best way, the fastest route to get to a desired more sophisticated all the time. The AI system owners already need AI revolution has only just begun.

The AI systems will need larger and larger data processing

capability. There are new proposals for data processing centers within or nearby most all of our nation's population centers including the Twin Cities. These proposals have already caused negative reaction. People complain about the noise from all the fans required to keep the computers cool. Some of the data centers will use large amounts of water for cooling, and people object to that; and they complain to their representatives in the state legislature. Some people complain about the new and very large power consumption for purposes they don't understand.

North Itasca Electric is a AI is beginning to show what member-owner of Great River Energy. GRE is making very large investments in new and cleaner power supply sources for all of the needs I've discussed here today and for countless other needs. Very large investments are also required for the electrical grid which connects the power sources destination. ARE YOU STORM READY?

Follow these safety and preparation tips during spring and summer storm season.

Be Prepared.

- · Create an emergency kit with power outage essentials: batteries, power banks, flashlights, non-perishable foods, water, medical supplies and prescriptions.
- · Develop an emergency family plan with meeting points, communication methods and evacuation routes. Share your plan with all family members.
- · Monitor weather for important updates that could impact your emergency plan.

Stay Safe.

- · Ensure a safe shelter. Stay away from windows and doors. In tornadoes, move to a basement or an interior room without windows.
- · Use portable generators safely: operate outdoors in well-ventilated areas, place on a flat, dry surface, do not overload and always read the operating manual before use.
- Severe storms can bring down tree limbs and power lines. If you encounter a downed line, stay back. Always assume a downed line is live and dangerous.

Five tips to reduce wildfire risks

Wildfires are no longer confined to the western United States. Traditionally associated with dry, fire-prone regions like California, wildfires are now affecting areas in the Midwest and even parts of the Southeast.

This shift is driven by rising temperatures, prolonged droughts and changing weather patterns, which are creating conditions ripe for fires in regions that historically saw fewer of them. As a result, more communities are now facing growing threats from wildfires, prompting a need for broader awareness and preparedness nationwide.

North Itasca Electric Co-op is working to reduce the risk of wildfires throughout our service territory. Through regular vegetation management and grid maintenance and hardening practices, we are proactively working to reduce risks and improve the reliability of our local system.

As a member of North Itasca Electric, there are steps you can take to prevent wildfires.

- 1. Properly extinguish campfires. Always douse your campfire with water, stir the ashes and ensure everything is cool to the touch before leaving the area.
- 2. Don't burn on windy days. Avoid outdoor burning when it's windy or dry, as embers can easily spread and ignite surrounding areas.
- 3. Clear vegetation and debris. Maintain a defensible space around your home by removing dry leaves, dead branches and other flammable materials.
- 4. Use equipment safely. Tools like lawnmowers or chainsaws can spark fires. Use them during cooler times of the day and keep them in good working condition.
- 5. Follow local fire regulations. Always check for burn bans or restrictions in your area before burning anything or using open flames outdoors.

The Edge Art Gallery is excited to display the work of two great artists, each of whom focuses on nature, but in very different genres. Don't miss this!

"Feathers, Fins and More" represents a culmination of book-learning, classroom education and, ultimately, working with a master carver who impressed upon artist Jim Lutgen "to remove just enough wood to create." Lutgen's wood might be selected from a basswood, a



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walnut, a white pine, a tupelo, a cedar or a butternut tree. And the careful chipping and carving away eventually yields to the image of a bird, a fish, a mammal --- perhaps even a human face. For this artist, it seems that wood has a magnetic property as he was a forestry technician for thirty-five years and has been creating such artwork for the last decade and a half. Lutgen notes that his desire to present each subject in an exceptional manner is almost as challenging as producing the focal carving. In addition to his discrete wood creatures, Lutgen also creates carvings on basswood panels that depict outdoor landscape scenes.

"Ducks, man, that's my life" quips Lee Thomas Kjos, our other featured artist. Indeed. At age five, he had memorized facts about every waterfowl occupant of the prairies, marshland, and pothole lakes of western Minnesota, the Dakotas, and Saskatchewan. At ten years old he enjoyed hunting them with his father. Since then, Kjos has spent approximately fifty years as a professional photographer, shelving his old Winchester Model 12 for a camera and expanding his territory. "[I've] chased birds from

Alaska to South America, weathering insane wind, crazy storms, the kind of brutal cold that'd even make a Minnesotan shiver and [I've endured] more leaky waders than [I] can remember --- all for the perfect image." And his efforts have certainly paid off. Kjos's award-winning photos have been widely published in magazines, advertisements, numerous calendars and his own four books. He has more "Ducks Unlimited" covers to his credit than any photographer in history. We get to experience some of it in his collection titled "Capture A Moment Tell A Story Move The People." Kjos emphasizes that the ideas for the subject matter are not his --- that the canvas and the images exist naturally and that he is "simply a conduit for capturing beauty in the raw." After a successful career in the corporate world, Kjos ditched the cubicle for a farm in Webster, Minnesota and founded Kjos Outdoors, a personal and commercial photography, design, video and illustration company.

Coffee Cookies

1 1/2 cup sifted flour

1/2 cup sugar

1/4 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons instant powdered coffee

3/4 cup butter

1 teaspoon vanilla

3/4 cup finely chopped walnuts (or amonds or pecans)

Combine flour, sugar, salt and coffee. Cut in butter. Add vanilla and mix lightly until dough can be pressed together into ball. Shape into balls the size of a walnut and roll in chopped nuts. (Nuts can also just be mixed into dough.) Flatten with bottom of glass that is dipped in sugar.

Bake at 325° for 20 minutes or until cookies are firm and spring back very lightly when touched.
