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save where we can, this helps offset what we do not have control over. Great River Energy has suggested they could have a roughly 3% rate increase in 2026, this would be about a 1.5% rate increase on your bill from North Itasca Electric. This increase would fall on the kWh side of your bill. I will have more information for you next month concerning the budget.
Our office professionals have been busy this past month. We took an opportunity to spend some time training on a few fo-

cal points. Our partner at CFC provided a deep dive on capital credits and they were able to hold the course in Cohasset. We made the decision to close the office that day. This was too much of an opportunity to enhance our understanding about the process and importance of capital credits.

Home heating for a bargain

Air source heat pumps provide year-round comfort that is efficient and cost-effective



As the summer heat begins to fade away and cooler air returns for another season, consumers may find themselves considering how to efficiently and cost-effectively heat their home throughout another Minnesota winter.

Advances in electric heating technology, particularly air source heat pumps (ASHP), are helping to make electricity the go-to choice. They perform well in cold climates and have quickly become cost competitive with conventional furnaces — even beating them in upfront cost when coupled with federal, state and local utility incentives.

ASHPs are three to five times more efficient than most traditional heating systems because it takes less energy to move heat around than to produce it. With a natural gas furnace, heat must first be created by burning gas and then additional energy distributes it throughout your home.

With an ASHP, the heat energy itself is taken from the air outside (even when temperatures drop well below freezing), meaning energy is only needed to transport and distribute that heat indoors. As a result, ASHPs are often far less expensive to run than other heating systems, translating to hundreds of dollars in annual savings for an average household.

While the annual expected cost of heating a home with a natural gas furnace can be slightly cheaper in some areas, ASHPs are far more affordable than propane. Members could expect to save \$600 annually to deliver the same amount of heat by switching from a propane furnace or boiler to an ASHP. Homeowners will also avoid the price volatility of oil, propane and gas.

Factor in available federal tax credits (30%, up to \$2,000 when installed before Dec. 31, 2025) and rebates from local electric cooperatives, ASHPs become an even more appealing investment.

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Cold weather rule & energy assistance program notice

In accordance with Minnesota’s Cold Weather Rule, electric service cannot be disconnected for nonpayment between Oct. 1 and April 30 if electricity is the primary heat source and ALL of the following statements apply:

- Your household income is at or below 50% of the state median household income. Income may be verified on forms provided by North Itasca Electric Cooperative or by the local energy assistance provider.
- You enter into and make reasonably timely payments under a payment agreement that considers the financial resources of the household.
- You receive referrals to energy assistance, weatherization, conservation, or other programs likely to reduce your energy bills from North Itasca Electric Cooperative. Minnesota’s Cold Weather Rule does not completely stop winter disconnects. Before disconnecting electric service to residential members between Oct. 1 and April 30:

North Itasca Electric Cooperative must provide:

- A 30-day notice of disconnection;
- A statement of members’ rights and responsibilities;
- A list of local energy assistance providers;
- Forms on which to request Cold Weather Rule

- protection; and
- A statement explaining available payment plans and other options to continue service.

Energy Assistance Program

The Energy Assistance Program (EAP) is a federally funded program through the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services which helps low-income renters and homeowners pay for home heating costs and furnace repairs. Household income must be at or below 60 percent of the state median income (\$71,999 for a family of four) to qualify for benefits. Applications must be received or postmarked by May 31, 2026. 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Meter seals

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By contacting North Itasca Electric, you can help prevent possible problems which could occur when North Itasca Electric finds that seals have been cut. These problems would mostly be on sub meters where load control meters are installed.

This equipment is owned, controlled and maintained by North Itasca Electric. These seals may only be cut if permission is granted by North Itasca Electric in advance or deemed an emergency by an electrician.

North Itasca Electric does realize that there could be instances where work needs to be done, in such

cases; North Itasca Electric still needs to be contacted. If it is determined that loads have not been controlled during load control periods, demand charges could be applied to your billing.

Doxo.com

There is an on-line bill pay website that appears to be affiliated with North Itasca Electric, but it is not. Doxo.com is third-party website that allows people to pay their electric bills via their site. However, doxo.com may charge the member extra fees, and North Itasca Electric cannot control when we will receive the member payments from doxo.com, possibly resulting in a late payment from the member or even disconnection due to non-payment. National Cybersecurity Awareness Month: 4 Best Bets to Stay Cyber Safe

Protecting yourself online doesn't have to be complicated or expensive. A few simple habits can dramatically reduce your risk of falling victim to cybercrime. While you can never be "hackproof," you can become resilient in the online world.

At the heart of online safety are four essential behaviors we at the National Cybersecurity Alliance call the Core 4. These simple steps will help shield your personal information, protect your online accounts and keep your devices secure.

1. Use long, unique, and complex passwords.

Your passwords are the first line of defense between a criminal and your sensitive information. Here's how to have amazing passwords:

- Every password must be long, unique and complex. Nowadays, every password should be at least 16 characters long, which significantly overwhelms password-cracking programs. Use a random mix of letters, numbers and symbols.

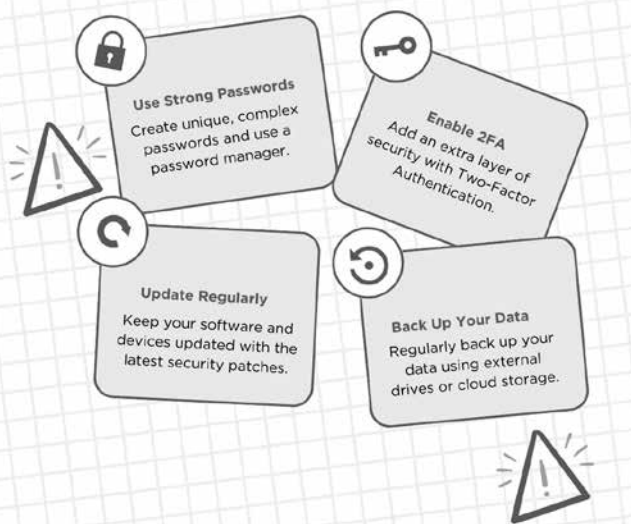
- Don't reuse passwords. Every account needs a unique password. Unfortunately, making small changes, like adding numbers or switching out an S with a \$, doesn't count as a unique password.

- Use a password manager to store and generate strong passwords. If you're wondering how to manage so many unique, long passwords, the answer is a password manager! There are many free, secure options. Password managers are the safest way to store your passwords. If you prefer to keep a password notebook, treat it like cash.

2. Enable multifactor authentication (MFA).

Multifactor authentication (sometimes called 2FA) adds an extra security layer by requiring something more than just your password to log in. Think of it as

using two locks on your digital door instead of only one. This could be:

- A one-time code sent to your phone
- A biometric scan like a fingerprint scan or FaceID
- A physical security key

Enable MFA on your accounts—especially email, banking and social media. It's a simple way to supercharge the security on your accounts. Also, never share MFA codes with anyone—this includes not sharing them over the phone, through texts or via email. Only scammers will ask for MFA codes.

3. Keep software updated. Software updates don't just bring new features. They often fix security flaws that criminals exploit. It usually takes a few minutes, but updates are worth it. Here are some tips:

- Turn on automatic updates when possible for your devices and apps. You can usually find these options in your Settings menu.
- Install updates promptly for your operating systems, browsers, antivirus tools and apps.
- Don't click Remind Me Later—the security is worth it.
- Remember your phones, smartwatches and tablets are computers, so keep these devices updated as well!

4. Look out for phishing and scams. Phishing remains the most common online threat. Criminals send fake emails, texts or social media messages to trick you into revealing sensitive information or clicking malicious links. These messages aim to get you to click before you think by playing your emotions. Scammers will even call you! Here's how to look out for phishing and scams:

- Be highly skeptical of unexpected messages, especially those urging immediate action or asking for personal details.

- Phishing emails can light up positive emotions ("You've won our sweepstakes!") or negative ones ("You've been hacked!").

- Don't click suspicious links or download unexpected attachments.

- Report phishing attempts to your email provider, social media platform or IT department.

- If you're unsure if a message is legit, ask a friend, coworker or family member. A second set of eyes can be invaluable in spotting scams.

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TIPS TO AVOID ENERGY SCAMS

Do you know the warning signs of an energy scam? Scammers will often use **high-pressure tactics** that create a sense of urgency. They may also ask for **unusual payment methods** such as gift cards or cryptocurrency. **Dodgy communication** is typically associated with a scam, including poor grammar, spelling errors or unusual email addresses. If you spot any of these warning signs, take a moment to pause and determine if it's legitimate or if it's a scam.



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Powerful precision tool improves reliability

In an industry that is cooperative manages rapidly evolving with infrastructure and new technologies and responds to transmission increasing demand for events. Previously, whenever a fault on the transmission system occurred, Great River Energy continues its strides to stay ahead by system occurred, Great River Energy's system tools and strategies. operators needed to One of those tools has rely on measuring their transformed how the geographic information

system (GIS) on screen to estimate the location of a fault. These faults could be caused by any variety of factors, including insulation breakdown, equipment failure or environmental factors like lightning — leading to power outages and possible damage to the power system. While this strategy worked well for many years, system operators were interested in making the process more efficient to locate faults faster and more accurately.

“System operations approached the GIS department and asked if there was a way we could help improve the efficiency of their fault location process, as the current process was cumbersome and time-consuming. So, we put our heads together to come up with a solution,” said Jeff Grussing, manager of GIS development and technology at Great River Energy.

After researching available solutions to this challenge, the two departments implemented a GIS-based system that allows Great River Energy to automate the entire process by leveraging measured routes to accurately trace and display fault locations based on data received from protective relays installed in substations. The GIS system also incorporates lightning strike data to help identify possible causes of momentary outages.

The two departments also collaborated with Great River Energy's IT development staff to develop a custom widget that enables near real-time access to this information. Now, when a fault occurs, the GIS tool quickly interprets the data, traces to the distance provided and then visually marks the probable fault location on a digital map. This allows system operators to quickly direct crews to precise locations without relying on manual measurement. The result is a faster, more accurate response that saves time, reduces operational costs and improves reliability. The system also stores the fault locations and lightning strike data for future analysis. Additionally, the fault locations can be displayed in a mobile app for workers to navigate to the exact site.

“The Great River Energy GIS fault tracing tool gives me precise fault locations down to the structure number. Isolation can be done within minutes with motor-operated switches, restoring members quickly and efficiently,” said Marshall Brown, system operator at Great River Energy. “Lineworkers are dispatched directly to the reported trouble area and can quickly identify the issue and begin repair activities.” The GIS tool also doubles as a post-event resource by providing system operations staff the ability to trace historical faults, drawing insights from past incidents to optimize relay configurations and improve accuracy. Overall, the new system enhances operational speed and accuracy in addition to supporting continuous improvement and smarter grid management.



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Roxanne's Sales Talk

STEAM DRYERS: How they work

Steam dryers work just like a conventional dryer but add steam into the drying process to reduce wrinkles, eliminate odors and sanitize clothes.

In heating and drying, just like any other dryer, steam dryers use hot air to dry the clothes. The wet clothes are tossed around the drum with the hot air circulating through them, evaporating the moisture from the clothes.

Steam generation:

Steam is then introduced into the drying cycle in one of two ways.

1. In-drum spray: A fine mist of water is sprayed into the drum,

which then turns into steam because of the existing hot air.

2. Dedicated steam generator: Some models have a built-in steam generator that produces steam directly, which allows a more efficient and controlled steam application.

Steam application:

The steam is released at specific points during the drying cycle. This process helps to penetrate the fabrics, softening them and reducing wrinkles. It also helps neutralize odors and sanitize the clothes by killing any germs and bacteria.

Benefits of a steam dryer:

Wrinkle reduction without ironing, odor elimination and sanitization. Because steam dryers can refresh clothes without a full wash cycle, this saves you time, energy and water.

Two things to consider when purchasing a steam dryer:

Cost: steam dryers usually cost a little more than traditional ones, not only in price but also in cost if you have to add another water line.

Installation: some require a connection to a water line to generate steam, while others use a refillable reservoir.

EOW has new dedicated deputy

The Northern Itasca Joint Powers Board met on August 27 with guests Sheriff Joe Dasovich, Chief Deputy Chris Peterson, Lieutenant Kyle Curtiss and Sergeant Jake Olson who presented a proposal for law enforcement coverage of the joint powers board area. The NIJPB includes the Edge of the Wilderness (EOW) cities of Effie and Bigfork, and Bigfork, Stokes and Marcell townships. It also includes Bigfork School and Bigfork Valley Hospital.

The Sheriff's Department presented five years of statistics on the municipalities, showing that last year Bigfork had 841 calls for service including 198 case files opened for more serious investigations, Effie had 238 calls with 36 case files opened, and Marcell had 268 calls with 35 case files opened.

The proposal included one or two full time deputies who – except for emergencies – would remain in the designated area. Hours when a deputy was not on duty would be covered, as now, by area deputies. Extra coverage for special events and public safety events would not incur more cost.

Matt Grose, superintendent of ISD318 was present and was asked about the school's need for a law enforcement presence. Grose pointed out "that kids knowing a deputy is around is important." He also spoke on the lifetime positive attitude toward law enforcement that kids could acquire from contact with a role model. District 318 serves the joint powers area except for Marcell, which is in ISD317.

Nathan Hough, CEO of Bigfork Valley, said the proposal appeared to be the best and most economical way to bring security to the hospital, and the board had supported an offer to fund one deputy. This would not add to the levy, he pointed out, which had already been finalized at no increase for 2026. The hospital also could offer a suitable office for the outreach deputy.

The next meeting of the NIJPB is Wednesday, Oct. 22 at 6 p.m. at the Discovery Center north of Marcell on Highway 38.

Bigfork sets preliminary levy at slight decrease

At its meeting on Sept. 9, the Bigfork City Council set the preliminary budget and levy request. The approved budget totaled \$940,915.13. The preliminary proposed payable 2026 levy is \$202,280.70, which represents a decrease of \$330 over last year's proposed levy.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 14 at 5:30 p.m. at City Hall.

Wasps used to slow the spread of emerald ash borer on the CNF

This September, the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources, Minnesota Department of Agriculture, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Forest Service will complete a joint biological control effort to slow the spread of emerald ash borer in the Chippewa National Forest.

This effort, known as the parasitoid wasp program, involves the release of three species of non-stinging wasps to target EAB at different life stages, helping slow EAB without harming

other species.

The three wasp species — oobius agriliis, tetrastichus planipennisi, and spathius galinae — are small and do not harm humans. They were selected by the USFS and tested extensively to ensure the wasps will not negatively impact other species or the environment.

MDA initiated the wasp program in 2010 to slow the spread of EAB in Minnesota. Since 2010, the program has expanded to 55 release sites in EAB-infested areas in the state. In 2025, 5,424

wasps were released in 200 acres of infested area of the Chippewa National Forest. A total of 8,480 wasps have been released over the last two summers. Currently no new infestation areas are within the forest according to MDA's EAB status map.

The DNR places a high priority on programs like this one that help support forest health and resiliency.

EAB was first discovered in Minnesota

in 2009. In its larval stage, EAB kills ash trees by tunneling under the bark and feeding on the part of the tree that moves nutrients up and down the trunk.

Minnesota forests are home to an estimated 1 billion ash trees. Minnesota cities also have an abundance of ash, making up 60% of the trees in some communities.

things that prompt artist Paul LaJeunesse to create the paintings you can see in our October exhibition. These works depict at least a part of the artist’s identity/relationship to the world.

But they also serve as “vehicles” to promote

deeper reflection upon our own “place” – our own individual and specific values, memories, – and, ultimately, our own connection to the **anima mundi**.

As he reconstructs **space**, LaJeunesse’s works have always revolved around the concept of “place”, albeit with different foci at various

times in his life. “I do not (now) attempt to depict a scene”, he explains. “The concept of place has neither subject nor object, rather it is the experience of responding to, and associating with, the physical environment.” In quoting human geographer Yi-fu Tuan, LaJeunesse seems to recognize that any thought about a present experience necessarily results in distance from the experience, yet --- also, necessarily --- results in a resurrection of memory. Thus, what might otherwise be an elusive moment is preserved, becomes permanent. Such a process, likely repeated in various physical places at various times, builds our *sense* of place. And meaning to our life then surfaces, becomes more apparent, and,



probably, more savored.

The importance that Paul LaJeunesse ascribes to the connection of place to people is represented in many different manners including, more recently, murals made to create a sense of place and identity for an entire community.

LaJeunesse obtained his Master of Fine Arts degree from Bowling Green University in 2006. He has since been the recipient of numerous prestigious awards and grants. Mr. LaJeunesse has permanent works in Minnesota and Tennessee and has exhibited all over the United States, as well as in the countries of Iceland, Saitama and Japan.

Several universities have welcomed him as an instructor, including the University of Minnesota-Duluth, which is where he now lives.

Ancient Greek and Roman philosophy held that the world soul is animated, infusing the cosmos with life and intelligence. So don’t miss this show! It is indeed an opportunity to drink in --- and contribute to! --- the **anima mundi**!



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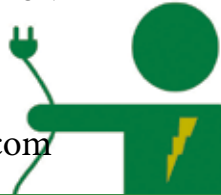

Zebra mussels confirmed in Bass Lake near Deer River

The Minnesota Department of Natural Resources has confirmed the presence of zebra mussels in Bass Lake, near Cohasset in Itasca County.

Itasca County Soil and Water Conservation District invasive species staff contacted the DNR after finding adult zebra mussels attached to settlement samplers on the north and south shores of Bass Lake. Settlement

samplers are solid surfaces temporarily placed in the water that people can regularly check for attached zebra mussels to aid in detection.

Itasca County SWCD staff deployed the settlement samplers as part of their prevention and early detection efforts. DNR invasive species staff confirmed the presence of zebra mussels at multiple other locations in Bass Lake.

Whether or not a lake has any invasive species, Minnesota law requires people to:

- Clean watercraft, trailers and equipment to remove

aquatic plants and prohibited invasive species.

- Drain all water and leave drain plugs out during transport.
- Dispose of unwanted bait in the trash.
- Never release bait, plants or aquarium pets into Minnesota waters.
- Dry docks, lifts and rafts for 21 days before moving them from one waterbody to another.

These additional steps reduce the risk of spreading aquatic invasive species:

- Decontaminate watercraft and equipment – find free stations on the courtesy decontamination page of the DNR website (mndnr.gov/decon).
- Spray watercraft and equipment with high-pressure water or rinse with water if high-pressure water is not available.
- Dry watercraft and equipment for at least five days before using in another waterbody.

People should contact a Minnesota DNR aquatic invasive species specialist (mndnr.gov/invasives/ais/contacts.html) if they think they have found zebra mussels or any other invasive species that was not already known to be in the waterbody.

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Flying Apple Flapjack

2 Tablespoons butter
2 Tablespoons packed brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
1 medium cooking apple, thinly sliced

2 eggs
1/2 cup flour
1/2 cup milk
1/4 teaspoon salt

Heat oven to 400°. Melt butter in 9 inch parchment-lined pie plate in oven. Sprinkle brown sugar and cinnamon over butter. Place apple slices on cinnamon/sugar mixture.

Beat eggs slightly in medium bowl, adding other ingredients just until mixed (do not overbeat). Pour batter over apple slices.

Bake approx. 30 minutes until puffed and golden brown. Right away, loosen edge of pancake and turn upside down on serving plate. Makes 2-4 servings.

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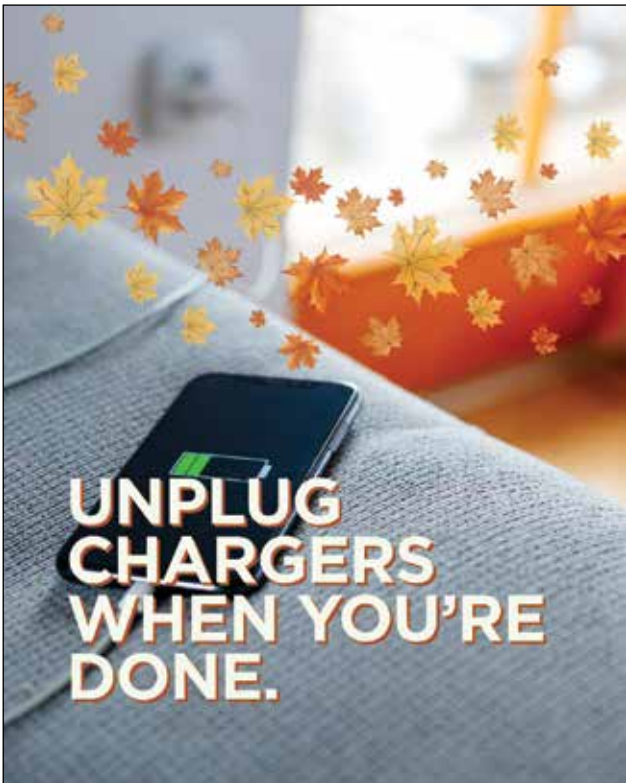
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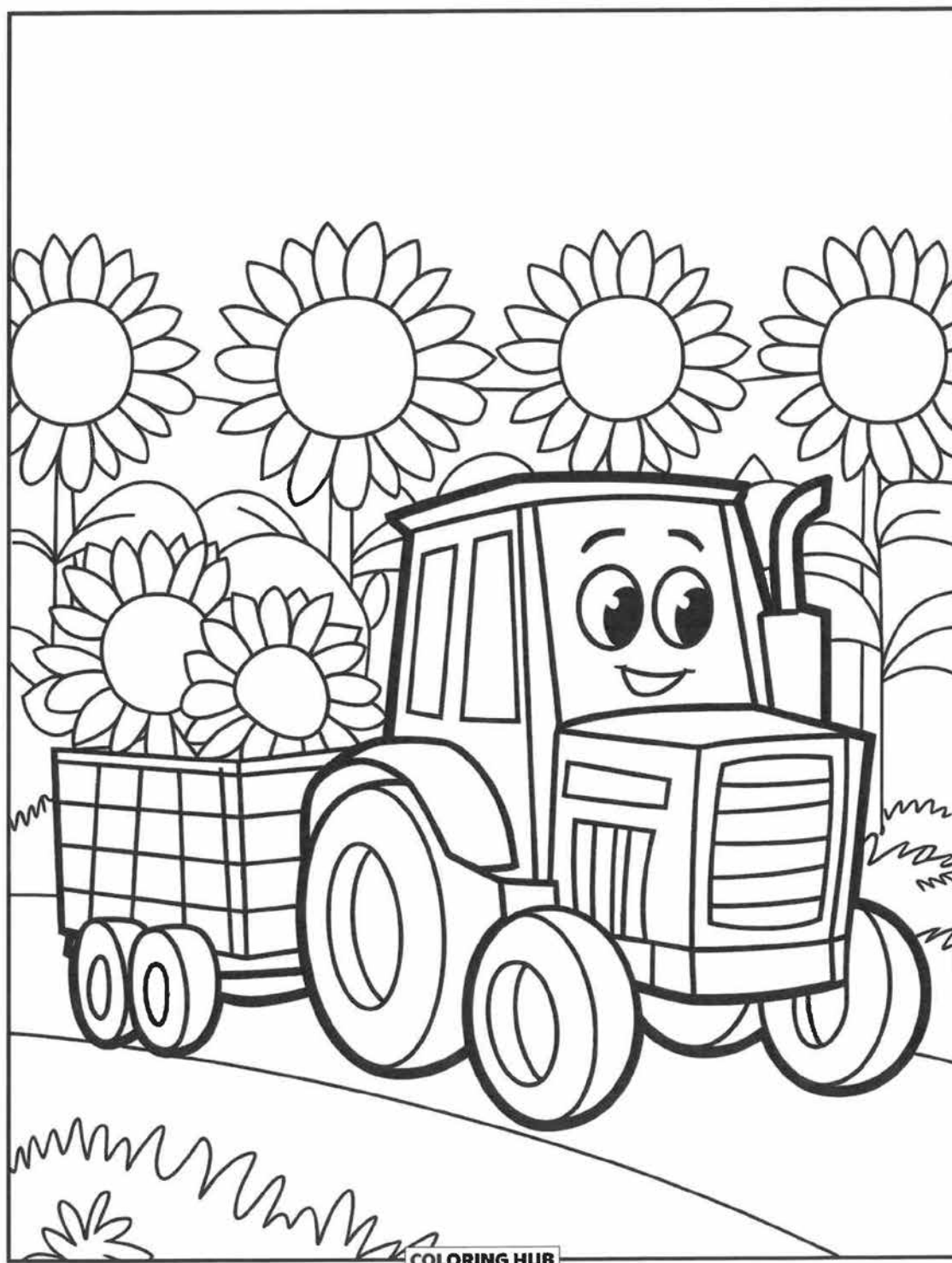
